



From the Pastor's Desk

The past few months have given us cause to reflect on our lives. God disciplines His own (Deut. 8:5; Heb. 12:11). We should be thankful for any discipline we receive for in it God corrects us just as an earthly father does to his children. This discipline includes a call for us to examine our lives according to the First Commandment. What is it that we fear, love, and trust in above all things? In what do we place our faith?

Luther writes in the Large Catechism concerning the First Commandment:

13] Thus you can easily understand what and how much this commandment requires, namely, that man's entire heart and all his confidence be placed in God alone, and in no one else. For to have God, you can easily perceive, is not to lay hold of Him with our hands or to put Him in a bag [as money], or to lock Him in a chest [as silver vessels]. 14] But to apprehend Him means when the heart lays hold of Him and clings to Him. 15] But to cling to Him with the heart is nothing else than to trust in Him entirely. For this reason He wishes to turn us away from everything else that exists outside of Him, and to draw us to Himself, namely, because He is the only eternal good. As though He would say; Whatever you have heretofore sought of the saints, or for whatever [things] you have trusted in Mammon or anything else, expect it all of Me, and regard Me as the one who will help you and pour out upon you richly all good things.

16] Lo, here you have the meaning of the true honor and worship of God, which pleases God, and which He commands under penalty of eternal wrath, namely, that the heart know no other comfort or confidence than in Him, and do not suffer itself to be torn from Him, but, for Him, risk and disregard everything upon earth. 17] On the other hand, you can easily see and judge how the world practises only false worship and idolatry. For no people has ever been so reprobate as not to institute and observe some divine worship; every one has set up as his special god whatever he looked to for blessings, help, and comfort.

The only access to the true God is through Christ (John 6:22-59). As we are led by the Holy Spirit away from the other gods in our life, we see Jesus even more clearly as the way, the truth, and the life, and rejoice all the more that He has been revealed to us as such. In all things let us be thankful, even in being disciplined, for God knows precisely what we need and when we need it. He always acts toward you out of love as displayed prominently on the cross. Dear Christians, cling by faith to the Triune God, He is the only eternal good and will deliver you from all evil according His good and gracious will.

“Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might” (Eccl 9:10).

God bids us to be faithful in the tasks He calls us to do. He calls us to be members of a family (husbands and wives; fathers and mothers; sons and daughters). He calls us to be members of society (those who govern and those who are governed). And He calls us to be members of His family, the Church (those who preach and teach and those who hear and learn). Each of these callings from God places a duty on us.

As members of a family, husbands are given the duty to die for their wives as Christ gave His life for His bride, the Church; while wives are given the duty to respect their husbands and submit themselves to them as the Church does to Christ. Fathers and mothers are to raise their children in the fear and admonition of the Lord, teaching them the Ten Commandments, the Creed, the Lord’s Prayer, and the Scriptures concerning Baptism, Confession, the Office of the Keys, and the Lord’s Supper. Children are to honor their parents throughout their lives, and even when their parents are no longer alive, serving and obeying them, loving and cherishing them, and speaking well of them.

As members of society, God calls those who govern to bear the sword, that is, to punish those who do evil (those who live contrary to God’s will) and to reward those who do good (those whose lives are lived in conformity with God’s will). Those who are governed are to obey their leaders as to the Lord Himself, for their leaders bear the sword of God’s temporal justice for a purpose.

As members of God’s own family, the Church, He calls those who preach and teach to do so in faithfulness to His holy Word. To preach and teach the Law of God to convict the hearts of hearers of their sin and to encourage, admonish, and exhort them to do good works in accordance with God’s will. They are to preach and teach the Gospel, the full forgiveness of their sins accomplished by Christ and received through faith, not by works. They are to administer the means of grace in accordance with the Gospel and the Word of God. They do all this for the young and old alike, for those who are near and far off. Those who hear and learn are to submit themselves to their preachers and teachers. They are support them by their prayers and their gifts.


Each of these callings from God place a duty on us. They make a claim on our presence; on our prayers; and our time, talents, and treasures. So, “Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might” (Eccl 9:10). Pray for your family, your government, and your church. Give of yourself by means of your time, your talents, and your treasures to your family, your government, and your Church. That is what it means to be faithful in the tasks that God has given us. That is what it means to do it with all your might.

The following mini-article was included in the September 10, 1907 issue of Der Lutheraner under the title Warum ich auch bei Regenwetter in die Kirche gehe.

Why I Also Go To Church When It's Raining

1. Because God sanctifies every Sunday through his Word and makes no exceptions just because it is raining.
2. Because I expect that our pastor will be tending to his duties, and I would be very astounded if he remained at home because of the weather.
3. Because my presence will be all the more necessary at church, the less the attendance unfortunately is on such days.
4. Because my example will have an influence on others under all circumstances, whether I attend worship or stay away.
5. Because I see that the unchurched people, even the weakest among them, do not abstain from their amusements just because it is raining.
6. Because the life to which a Christian is called may never be dependent on the change of the barometer, and because my behavior towards God's Word is a measurement of my love towards him.
7. Because I make the observation: those who use the excuse not to go to church because of the cold, heat, or because it is raining – these also make excuses when the weather is beautiful.
8. Because the man who shrinks away because of such small difficulties may finally fear hindrances which are only figments of his imagination. Whoever follows the Lord from afar, as Peter did on the night of Holy Thursday, he easily is in danger of denying him completely.
9. Because it can be, that according to God's will, a special blessing awaits me in church on a rainy day.
10. Because I do not know how many Sundays I have left on this earth.


We would like to get the families involved in Sunday School to start the year. We will start with a big group class spread out at tables in the fellowship hall. Parents of small children are asked to stay with their kids to help with social distancing and keeping the kids focused on the lesson. We will provide snacks for everyone (in a safe manner) and hoping to do some crafts, projects/activities, and some simple songs. Depending on the number of kids attending, we may branch into 2 or 3 groups in the larger classrooms.



Another change to start the school year – we are planning some family field trips. The first will be on Rally Day Sunday, September 20th. Families are invited to meet in the fellowship hall immediately after church service (hopefully for donuts and beverages if we can figure out how to serve them). We will have a quick message from Pastor Suggitt as a group, and then we will drive to Kohl Farms for family fun in the Corn Maze! There is a signup sheet in the North narthex, so I can let the farm know about how many families to expect.

The next family event will be Sunday, October 11th. Again, Pastor Suggitt will have a short message in the fellowship hall and a snack. Then everyone is encouraged to come with the kids to tour Smith's Alpaca Farm near Gagetown.

Please be patient as we work through all the nuances of Sunday School during COVID.





The regular meeting of St. Paul Ladies Aid was called to order by President Ruth Fluegge on Sunday, August 9, 2020 following our worship service

Ten ladies answered roll call with one guest, Faye Errer, in attendance. The secretary's report from a brief meeting that was held on Sunday, June 28, 2020 was read. A motion was made by Wanda Dubs and supported by Janet Truemner to accept the Secretary's report as read. Carried.

Treasurer Ruth Kumaus gave account of the Ladies Aid treasury – Checking: \$18,801.83; Savings: \$11,275.53; Petty Cash: \$161.25.

Discussion was held on the church bazaar-type sale. Ruth Kumaus brought up a liability issue if we should go forward with it. Would the church be liable if someone attended our bazaar and then was diagnosed with the Covid 19 virus? Ruth Fluegge said she would have Rich check with the health department to find out how we should proceed if we have the bazaar.

After much discussion we decided to vote.

Plan A: Farm market in the parking lot

Plan B: Sell items only to our congregation members (and their friends, families – ordered through members)

Members voted to go with Plan B.

It was decided we would offer the following:

1. 100 gift baskets –
 - A. Ladies baskets
 - B. Home baskets
 - C. Baby baskets
 - D. Christmas baskets
2. Pre-order Soup Sale
3. Pre-order Canned Goods - a price sheet with available items will be ready soon
4. Pre-order Pie Sale – 3 varieties only
5. Pre-order Butterhorns & Cut-out cookies

Items will be offered to the congregation on the first-come, first-serve basis. When they're gone, they're gone. Orders must be made via email to the church secretary for most items.

We will have drive-thru pick up on designated dates. Members will pre-order their items; drive thru the parking lot on the given date; pick up and pay. They must write a check or have the exact change for their order.

Sandy presented a request from the Fort Wayne Seminary Food Bank for monetary help to purchase items needed for students attending there. Wendy Tabar made a motion to give \$500 to the Food Bank; supported by Peggy Parrish. Carried.

Wanda Dubs made a motion to adjourn; supported by Peggy Parrish. Carried.

We closed the meeting with the Lord's Prayer and singing the doxology.

CONSIDER AN ORPHAN GRAIN TRAIN VOLUNTEER TEAM






