

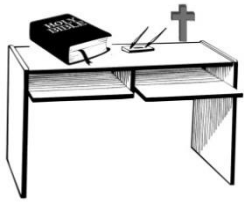

From the Pastor's Desk

Lent is a penitential season, which means it is season of repentance. We began with Ash Wednesday and in a real way reminded and marked ourselves as ones, who because of our sin, will return to dust. This isn't to flippantly say, "Yeah, we are all sinners therefore we die because the wages of sin is death." It is to realize that *my* sin has drastic consequences,

that I shouldn't take them so lightly, and that I should return to the Lord in repentance and faith.

The Scriptures say much about repentance. It is at the heart of John the Baptist's proclamation, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matt. 3:2), and Jesus preaches the same sermon, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matt. 4:17). So it is a big deal, yet I think we have to unpack what repentance truly is to recognize the theme of the Lenten season.

Our Lutheran Confessions help explain it in a simple, concise way. "*Now, repentance consists properly of these two parts: One is contrition, that is, terrors smiting the conscience through the knowledge of sin; the other is faith, which is born of the Gospel, or of absolution, and believes that for Christ's sake, sins are forgiven, comforts the conscience, and delivers it from terrors.*" (Augsburg Confession XII 2-5)

Lent aids to orientate us to recognize our sinfulness - which comes from the preaching of the Law - to bring about contrition, terror and sorrow, over our sinfulness in transgressing God's Law. Thus, true repentance doesn't say "Yeah, we are all sinners," but rather humbly confesses "*I myself* have sinned against God," and is stricken with that reality. Adam and Eve provide the example of what this looks like. After eating the fruit that was forbidden by God, they saw their nakedness and were ashamed. They covered themselves with fig leaves and hid from God (Gen. 3:7,8). This is a picture of terror: hiding from God and His voice.

But thankfully, Lent doesn't offer only that. Notice the second part of repentance as explained in the Confessions: *faith born of the Gospel*. This Gospel is Jesus crucified for terrified, sorrowful sinners that all their hope would be in Him. So in Lent we also continue to hear of our Lord's great sacrifice for us, His love and promises, just as Adam and Eve did after their fall. The Lord found them in the garden and spoke the Gospel to them (Gen. 3:15) and they mix that promise with faith and trust. Lent leads us to Good Friday and Easter yet all the while continues proclaiming the forgiveness found in Jesus crucified and raised from the dead.

This Lent, may the Lord grant us true repentance, that we may hear the preaching of the Law and sorrow over our sin, but all the more may we hear and believe the beautiful word of the Gospel, and believing it, have life and salvation in the name and gifts of Jesus Christ our Lord.

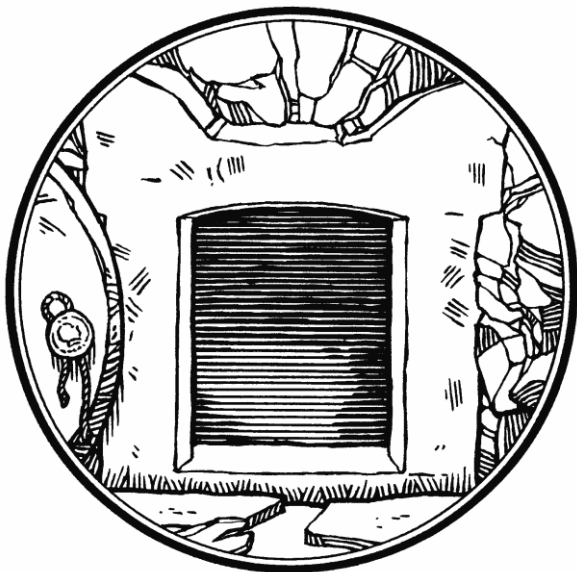

A motion was made by Margaret Timmons and supported by Joyce Metzger to do a scaled-down version of this fundraiser since McDonald's Foodland is now closed and they sold a good number of them for us; Carried March 27th was chosen for the production date.
2. Sandy will get pricing for the necessary goods needed and place the order. She will also post a job list for people to sign up to help that day.

New Business:

1. Sandy asked for volunteers to serve on the Altar Guild at St. Paul. We would like to have 12 teams of 2 people to serve, one month per year. The veteran members of the guild will help train the new members. Several ladies volunteered. We will continue to search out more new members.
2. Ruth Fluegge asked if she should order the Easter lilies for the altar from the florist is Cass City who supplied the poinsettias for Christmas. Joyce Metzger stated that she

had already inquired about Easter lilies at Jackie's in Sebewaung. Ashley, the florist there said she could get them for us. Joyce volunteered to get the lilies.

A motion was made by Joyce Metzger and supported by Margaret Timmons to adjourn the meeting; carried. The meeting concluded by singing the doxology and praying the Lord's Prayer.

Kenny & Tiffany Shepard

Tiffany is daughter of Dean & Julie Kreh. She has been a member of St. Paul since she was confirmed in the church. Tiffany enjoyed singing with her Mom and the members of St. Paul's church choir before leaving for college.

Tiffany and Kenny were married at St. Paul on April 23, 2016. They recently moved back to the Owendale area to be closer to family. They have two children Jaxson, two and Charlotte, one. Both were baptized at St. Paul, with Charlotte being baptized at Kreh's dining room table as the pandemic was shutting down public places.

The move home was stressful as they lived with Tiffany's parents for 18 months, while finding a place to live. They just moved into their home – a home which was moved on the family farm in June of last year. It took all summer to complete the job, but in October, it was moving day.

October was also a month for a job for Tiffany, as she was unemployed most of the 18 months she was back home. In November she accepted a new position with DTE Energy as a wind turbine technician based out of Bad Axe. This is what she went to trade school to do. She now, locally climbs and repairs the wind turbines.

January 3, 2021, Kenny woke up experiencing blurred double vision. He went to the ER in Pigeon and was transferred to McLaren in Bay City. They were thinking he had a stroke, but later, after many tests and 5 days in the hospital, was diagnosed with MS. This has resulted in many hospital outpatient steroid drips, followed up by steroid packs. He has been unable to drive, work, or help in the house or with the kids.

Two weeks ago, he had nasal surgery to remove a large polyp that was discovered during his hospital stay. This will help his breathing. He is on a waiting list for a sleep test.

He had an initial consultation with a neurologist. She was extremely helpful at explaining MS. She informed Kenny that stress and heat can trigger flare-ups. The goal is to remain flare up free, because after each flare up a person can lose mobility or functionality permanently. The doctor has applied to receive approval from the insurance company for specialty MS drugs. We await the answer.

At Kenny's next appointment the doctor will have a better idea of the type and stage of Kenny's MS after reviewing all his tests and MRI. The doctor did tell Kenny this will be a lifelong disease. With all that being said, Kenny's current job will need to change so that it does not cause flare ups.

Thank you for all your continued prayers for Kenny and his family. Kenny has had his vision restored now and it appears to be back fully. The doctor said this is good news as it appears that he responded well to the steroid treatment.

Where Did The Alleluia Go?

There is one word that we often use in the Divine Service that isn't used during Lent. It is usually used after responsories, antiphons, before the reading of the Holy Gospel, and other places. If you have not noticed yet, it is the word *alleluia*. We stop singing and saying *alleluia* during Lent and won't speak it again until Easter morning.

During Lent, we fast from using the *alleluia* (which is Hebrew for "Praise the Lord") as we focus in on the suffering and death of Jesus. This joyful word makes its entry again when we celebrate the Resurrection of Our Lord when the first words you hear will be:

Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

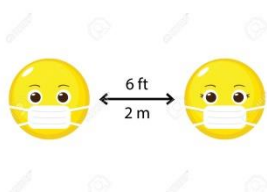
St. Paul Mother-Daughter Brunch and Bridal Show will be Saturday, May 8th at 11:00 a.m.

Sunday School celebrated Valentine's Day with a *Jesus Loves Me Party*. After Pastor's lesson, the kids made ice cream sandwiches and played a fun game with candy hearts. We put up another wall decoration in the South narthex – God's Conversation Hearts. Everyone was asked to choose a Bible verse talking about God's love and write it on a heart. The purpose of the display is for us to be reminded of God's unconditional love and mercy toward us and to encourage families to talk about that love in their homes. If you would like to add a verse to the wall, we have extra hearts! Let's be mindful to read our Bibles and talk about God in our daily lives.

We are now into the Lenten season. As we prepare our hearts for Easter, we should examine ourselves daily and repent of our sins.
