***So faith comes from hearing, and hearing through the word of Christ.
Romans 10:17***



The usually long, cold days of February are broken up by Valentine's Day which lands right in the middle of the month. St. Valentine was a real person who died for confessing faith in Jesus in the third century. Valentine was executed because he confessed without hesitation where true love is found - in our Lord Jesus who lays down His life for us.

Not as well known in the month of February is the remembrance of Aquila, Priscilla, and Apollos whose day comes on the thirteenth: one day before St. Valentine's Day. They also confessed the love of God found in His only-begotten Son. But they're not remembered as martyrs (someone who is executed for believing in Jesus). They're remembered as ones who loved to spread the love of God. They loved to break up the long, cold days of unbelief by bringing the Gospel to those who needed to hear it.

Aquila and his wife, Priscilla, were forced out of Rome and joined the apostle Paul in Corinth where they proclaimed Christ even as they made tents as a trade (See Acts 18:1-3). They then went with Paul to Ephesus where the two of them established a home that served as hospitality headquarters for new Christians. It was in Ephesus that Aquila and Priscilla met Apollos. Apollos was an eloquent man and spoke boldly in the synagogue concerning our Lord Jesus. Aquila and Priscilla helped Apollos mature in the faith and later he traveled from Corinth to Achaia where he "showed by the Scriptures that the Christ was Jesus" (Acts 18:28).

Their love of proclaiming and spreading the Word of God is not only something to be remembered in the middle of a cold February but also a beautiful example to us. We too should want to mature in the faith and bring the love that Jesus has revealed to us to others. We want missionaries to be sent and to help support and pray for them. We want to be eloquent where God has placed us and share the Gospel with our families and the place we live. We want the long, cold days of unbelief to be replaced with the bright warmth of John 3:16 - "God so loved the world, that He gave His only-begotten Son."

The Prayer of the Day for Aquila, Priscilla, and Apollos:

Triune God, whose very name is holy, teach us to be faithful hearers and learners of Your Word, fervent in the spirit as Apollos was, that we may teach it correctly against those who have been led astray into falsehood and error and that we might follow the example of Aquila and Priscilla for the good of the Church You established here and entrusted into our humble care; for You, O Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, live and reign, one God, now and forever.

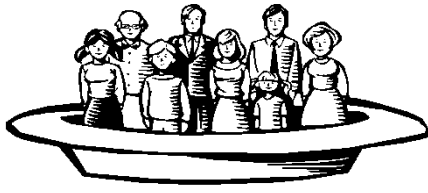

STEWARDSHIP

Open our eyes Lord to see Your love's intent,
To know with minds and hearts its depth and height
May thankfulness be days in service spent
Reflection of Christ's life, and love, and light. (*LSB* 788)

As stewards enter the month of February, it is fitting that we look at the last stanza of the stewardship hymn, "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (*LSB* 788). It is in these words that we see that the heart of stewardship is indeed love. Love has flowed from our Lord to us in the person and work of Jesus Christ. This love is then to flow from us to others. Being a conduit of love is really the central task of what it means to be a steward. The Lord entrusts us with His love that reconciles us to Himself, so that we might be stewards of the Gospel reconciliation that is freely given through us to those around us.

If we don't see this love from God to us, then through us, to others, our eyes will be closed not just to the needs of those around us. They will also be closed to the very heart of the Gospel itself. This is why the hymnist prays that the Lord would "Open our eyes, Lord, to see Your love's intent, To know with minds and hearts its depth and height."

Only when we are immersed in God's Holy Word, washed in Holy Baptism's life-giving water and fed on the holy, precious, body and blood of Jesus in the Holy Supper, will the Spirit be able to open our eyes to see the Lord's loving intent for us, and those we know and love. Sin blinds us. It makes us think that we are the center of our world, and our pleasure is the key.

In the Word, the Lord shows us the depth and height of His love. The depth of that love is what moved Him from His throne in heaven into our world. There He would don our human flesh, walk the dusty roads of Palestine, and set His face toward Jerusalem. Once there we get to see the height of His love, as He is elevated on a Roman cross to die a death that we deserve. But that would not be the end. He would be lowered into a tomb for three days. On that third day we then see the heights of love ascended to in His resurrection. This resurrection is already ours too!

The depth and height of this love poured out on us by the Holy Spirit then is distributed through us to others. Christ's servant love is shown in our servant love. The hymn utters the prayer of every Christian steward:

May thankfulness be days in service spent
Reflection of Christ's life, and love, and light.

This is the task for which stewards were originally created. Bearing the image of creation and redemption, we reflect Christ's love to those around us. The light of Christ shining through us to others is the true stewardship to which we are called. It takes place in our homes. It is lived out in our workplaces and classrooms. As we bear the life, love and light received in Word and Sacrament, we carry it out in service to our neighbor and for the glory of God!

Forgive us, Lord, when our stewardship of thankfulness is shallow or lacking! Fill us with Your life, love and light! Not just for us, but through us to those we know and love, that they may know Your life, love and light for them!



Old habits are hard to break

We've all heard that line before, but it is true. Just think of your own habits – like your morning routine for example. Personally, I begin with my electric toothbrush (that took a while to get used to). I always first brush the upper right side; then the upper left. Next is the bottom left, then bottom right followed by a couple sloshes of water and an extra one, just in case. I then wash my face and eyes with plain water. When I shower, I always wash my left armpit first. Changing habits is very hard to do. If you don't believe me, try altering your morning routine.

The start of a new year is usually a time when we are creating new habits – usually exercise, diet, financial budgeting. If we're lucky and one of them sticks it's usually a good thing that will improve our lives.

While some of our habits require a little more effort to keep, they are also easier to break. Whether by allowing ourselves to slough off a time or two; or by just being too busy in our lives – until at some point it no longer is a habit at all, just an afterthought.

I hope attending Sunday services does not become one of your broken habits or an afterthought. Attending Sunday service is a good habit.

Let's not let complacency or other activities creep in and deter us from keeping our Sundays open to hear His word.

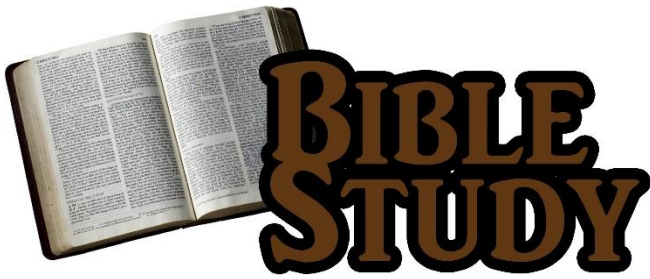
