It was truly a pleasure to have St. Paul host a one-day conference *In His Image* put on by Doxology. Doxology began as an effort to sustain and care for pastors as they labor in the vineyard of the Lord's Church. For the past 17 years they have continued to do just that. Offering retreats, gatherings, continuing education, and spiritual care, Doxology, a Recognized Service Organization of the LCMS, travels the country to care for men who care for others. Included in their work, they offer conferences for not only for pastors but also teachers, leaders of congregations, and simply any lay person who wants to dig deeper into God's Word and practical teaching concerning current events. We had one of those conferences, *In His Image*, here at St. Paul on Saturday, Feb. 22.

The morning began with registration, coffee, and treats. Then, to kick things off right, around 60 of us who attended the conference gathered in the sanctuary to pray the office of Matins. The organ and singing were superb. The sermon was based on Psalm 1 and John 15:4-8 with the theme of "Blessed is the man who delights in the law of the Lord. He is like a tree planted by streams of water" (from Ps. 1). Following Matins, we made our way into the parish hall.

The first session was given by Rev. David Fleming titled, "Wonderfully Made: Christian Worldview and Sexuality." We were reminded from God's Word that we are God's wonderful creation, created either male or female, and that our bodies (which will be raised from death at the resurrection) are given to us to live in our homes and communities to carry the image of Jesus as His redeemed creation. We were encouraged to be a living sacrifice (Romans 12:1-2) in service to the truth of God's Word in our roles of male and female, husband and wife, and reminded that manhood and womanhood is not something to be achieved but rather is given by God.

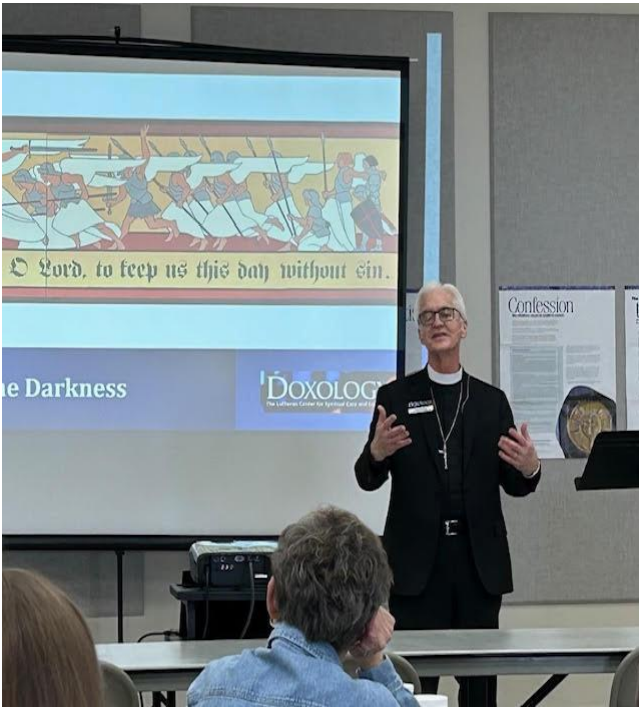
Dr. Beverly Yahnke, a clinical psychologist, served as the presenter for the next session titled, "Caring for the Child Who Identifies as Transgender." We learned that this phenomenon affects a very small portion of the population but is inflated by many sources. Dr. Yahnke lamented the fact that against solid, professional practice, many children are being encouraged down this path and are being harmed by hormone treatments and surgeries often against the will of the parents of a child who is being allowed to make life altering decisions at a very young age. She offered the titles of several books for further reading.

The third session, led by Dr. Yahnke, explored the "Essentials for Traveling Through Difficult Conversations." She encouraged a listening ear, being approachable, finding something to agree on, and making a plan prior to the conversation. Love involves the risk of disagreement, but can lead to a fruitful and helpful discussion.

Rev. Fleming led the final session with the theme of "Light in the Darkness: Christian Responses to Conflict in a Sexually Toxic Culture." He highlighted that the Christian isn't battling other people, but ultimately the battle is against the powers of darkness, that is, the devil and his horde. We Christians have the victory of Christ and the full armor of God to shine our Lord's truth in dark places. This is where our strength is found against all attacks. A brief question and answer session wrapped up the excellent conference. We departed with prayer.

The event was a resounding success and there were many hands to help it go well. The Ladies Aid spearheaded lunch, treats, and drinks for everyone. Many others helped with clean-up. Thank you to all who attended and helped. God be praised that our little place could host such a timely event and I pray all were encouraged by what was said that day!

The menu will include broasted chicken, meat and cheese tray, bread, a couple salads, a veggie tray, beverages and dessert. We will use real silverware.

4. A motion was made by Sandy Salcido to replace the vinyl tablecloths on the long tables in the fellowship hall; supported by Melissa Deming; carried.

New Business:

1. Sunday School asked for help cleaning up after Sunday School/Coffee Hour. Several ladies said they would help.
2. Altar Guild members were reminded that the candelabras and snuffers need to be cleaned quarterly (January, April, July and October). Jen Timmons has agreed to serve on Altar Guild to fill the vacancy after Peggy Parrish's passing.
The Altar Guild schedule will be shuffled so everyone knows what the responsibilities are during all months of the year.

5. Joyce Metzger mentioned the congestion at the foot of the stairs at funerals for people who wish to do a memorial. Sandy will talk with Pastor on what can we do to solve this issue.
6. Discussion was held on the Mother/Daughter Banquet. Brandy Gunsell, Sandy Salcido, Melissa Deming and Shirley Fritz agreed to chair this event.

We closed the meeting with the singing of the doxology and saying the Lord's Prayer.

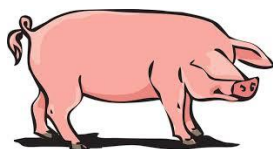
St. Paul Sunday School and Ladies Aid are joining forces to produce cheeseballs that will be ready for pick-up before Easter.
