



He is not here, for he has risen, as he said. Matt. 28:6

The angel didn't roll away the stone to let Jesus out of the tomb on Easter morning. The angel rolled away the stone to show the women that Jesus wasn't in there because He was risen from the dead and left the tomb empty. The resurrection had already taken place. The angel moved the stone to prove it.

Our risen Lord appeared to the disciples while they were in a room with the doors shut and locked. No one secretly let Him in through the doors. Just as He needed no one to remove the stone for Him, He needed no one to give Him access to the room because after His resurrection, Jesus no longer limits Himself to the constraints of humanity. Yes, He is always flesh and bone as us, but He is also God, and after the resurrection He allows Himself full use of His divinity, for He was raised in glory.

To show that He is still flesh and blood He shows Himself to His disciples, He has Thomas touch His wounds, He eats and drinks with them. Yet, Jesus does this not because He needs food to sustain His life but to prove that He is the risen Savior and confirm the disciple's faith in His resurrection. The same man who died for them is risen and then He shows it by many proofs (Acts 1:3). He doesn't have to bang on the stone or knock at the door to get where He wants to go. He subjected Himself to our limitations for a time in order to bear our sin and face death for us. But no more. After putting Himself in our place He rises from death, to deliver us who through the fear of death were subject to lifelong slavery (Heb. 2:15) that we would have confidence to draw near the throne of grace and find help in time of need.

This time of year, you may see documentaries or other shows that try to find an answer of how or why Jesus wasn't in the tomb or other myths surrounding our Lord. This has already been tried according the Biblical record. When trying to debunk the resurrection, the chief priests said to the guards, *"Tell people, "His disciples came by night and stole him away while we were asleep." So they took the money and did as they were directed* (see Matt. 28:11-15). Don't fall for it. Jesus didn't need the disciples to take Him away anymore than He needed the stone moved or the doors to be unlocked. He is risen, just as He said. No one or no thing can keep the triumphant Christ down and His Easter miracle from being proclaimed and heard. The news of His glorious victory over the grave comes to you, the Lord Himself comes to you, and you are strengthened in the faith. The proof of the resurrection is the proof of you being raised with your Lord and because He lives you will live also!



The monthly meeting of St. Paul's Ladies Aid was called to order by President Ruth Fluegge on Sunday, March 2, 2025, immediately following our worship service. Twelve ladies answered roll call. A devotion from the *Portals of Prayer* was read by the Ladies Aid secretary entitled "Almighty God and Man". 'Jesus endured the cross knowing that when He had completed His task of taking our punishment, His glory awaited Him. When we are going through difficult times, we, too, can look forward to seeing Christ as He is now, standing in His glory waiting for you.'

Old Business:

1. Ruth Kumaus stated that at its February 4, 2025, meeting, the Church Council granted approval for Ladies Aid to take back full responsibility for its financials. However, for this change to become effective the Ladies Aid must formally vote to make the change. Ruth stated that detailed procedures had been written for the administration of the Ladies Aid financials. These designated that the Ladies Aid Treasurer would have overall responsibility for the financials. Additionally, two Signer/Auditors would be designated by the Ladies Aid to audit the financials as well as assist as check signers and cover for the Treasurer when unavailable. All of these positions would have check signing rights. The Church Treasurer would no longer have any responsibility on the account. This change would become effective as soon as all arrangements could be finalized by the Bank with a goal to be as soon as April 1, 2025.

A motion made by Ruth Fluegge; supported by Jyl Shope; approved by all Ladies Aid members to take back full responsibility for the Ladies Aid financials.

3. More discussion was held concerning the purchase of a new single door refrigerator and a 6-burner range. Much research has been done by the committee and they are getting closer to selecting these appliances. We're hoping to have the new refrigerator in time for the Pork Dinner on March 30th.

4. Mother/Daughter Event

The committee asked if anybody had any ideas on what we should do this year. Ruth Fluegge thought it would be nice to do a potluck meal. The Ladies Aid would furnish the meat and participants would supply a side dish, a salad or a dessert. Everybody thought that sounded like a great idea.

Ruth Kumaus showed a bin that contained the programs from previous years that her mother, Marion, had saved. We will read through them and maybe use some of the ideas that were done years ago such as tribute to mothers, tribute to daughters, etc.

New Business:

1. The treasurer asked if we would be willing to transfer \$3,000 to our savings account to begin rebuilding our 'cushion' since we are using some of the funds to buy new appliances for the kitchen. Discussion was held. A motion was made by Margaret Timmons to make the transfer; supported by Joyce Metzger; approved.

A motion was made by Joyce Metzger; supported by Wendy Tabar to adjourn the meeting. We closed the meeting with the Lord's Prayer and sang the doxology.


