

St. Matthew interprets for us the prophecy given in Isaiah 7:14, Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall call his Immanuel (see Matthew 1:22-23 which quotes Is. 7:14). Matthew lets us know that Immanuel means "God with Us" and applies this title specifically to Jesus.

Jesus is "God with us", that is, God in human flesh who has come to save. Christmas is the revealing of this great prophecy and truth - that you don't have a God who just looks on you from afar, but rather One who comes very near - that He is not above being born in the muck and the mire of the animal stall in order to deliver His people from their own uncleanness. This makes "God with us" the most profound and joyous thing! It makes the angels rejoice. It makes the Magi travel a long way to lay eyes on prophecy come true. It makes us sit in wonder on Christmas to know our loving God is with us. Veiled in flesh the Godhead see, Hail the incarnate Deity! (LSB 380) Who doesn't love Christmas?



Even if you don't have anything under the tree or don't get invited to any dinners, Christmas still means God with Us has come. Could you or all the earth receive a better gift? Could you have a better feast than what He prepares for you? The fact is, to believe what Matthew is telling us is to believe there is joy for you at Christmas no matter what. Yes, sometimes it can be hard when we think of days gone by or loved ones who no longer take their place at our tables. But the Savior of the world has come and we have hope and strength in that - in Him.

Let Christmas banish all your sadness! One and all, great and small, come with songs of gladness (LSB 360). The world thinks it has it all if the presents are stacked knee deep, but we know of God with Us in the babe come in the manger and nothing can change that. Truth be told, we let that change us.

Doth come to serve the sinner in great meekness.

With us are one,
Dost join us and our children in our weakness. (LSB 372)*

This past weekend I, your 'elder, elder', was in a musical play entitled "Scrooge". The big musical number was "Thank you very much, Thank you very much, that's the nicest thing anyone's ever done for me".

Most of you have seen or know about the miser Scrooge. He was infatuated with wealth, extremely cold-hearted, and definitely an unforgiving person – especially when it came to his debtors of which he had many. He treated everyone with disdain.

I portrayed several bit characters. One, a gentleman who had the misfortune of collecting donations to buy the poor some meat and drink for Christmas. You could guess how that conversation went!

As the story continues, Scrooge is confronted by the ghost of his long-deceased partner, Jacob Marley who shows Scrooge the long, heavy chains that he must wear for eternity. He says Scrooge must change his ways or he will wear chains that are even heavier. Marley then tells him that three spirits will confront him during the night.

The first spirit is called the Ghost of Christmas Past. She tells Scrooge she is there for his welfare and redemption. She reminds him how he went from a sad, dejected little boy to a young man who lost his only love and chance for marriage and happiness because of his love for work and money.

The next hour he is confronted by a giant – the Ghost of Christmas Present who gives Scrooge a drink of 'the milk of human kindness'. As he drinks it, he finds that he likes it. He likes it a lot. The giant keeps giving Scrooge more 'milk'. He is beginning to soften up a bit and is transformed into someone who cares. Then, the giant shows him how poor his long-time employee, Bob Cratchit's family is at their meager Christmas celebration. They are thankful for it and enjoying it and even thanking that miser Scrooge for all they have.

As the giant leaves, the third spirit arrives – the Ghost of Christmas-to-Come. He shows Scrooge how jubilant and thankful the entire town is when they see his casket displayed in the town square, so much so that they break out into singing '*Thank you very much, that's the nicest thing anyone has ever done for me*'. Then the phantom leads him to the grave of Tiny Tim, the small, crippled son of his employee, Bob Cratchit. He is guilt-ridden. The phantom shows him his own grave and he realizes that his time is short.

He becomes transformed. He awakes on Christmas morning a changed man. He goes and buys gifts for the poor Cratchit family. He then goes about forgiving all his debtors and proceeds to enjoy Christmas with his family.

Just like Scrooge we can be stingy with our things, unforgiving at times and miserly, even cold-hearted. We struggle when confronted, scoff at changing our ways and are afraid of hearing the truth. But when we hear God's word spoken to us it's just like the 'milk of human kindness' the giant gave Scrooge. We like it! It leads us to change our ways, even to forgive and treat others with kindness. So when Pastor reminds us that God sent his only son to die on the cross for our sins shouldn't we all break out into singing 'Thank you very much, etc.'?



To celebrate the spirit of generosity across Huron County, the Huron County Community Foundation (HCCF) proudly presents the Community Philanthropy Award. This honor was introduced in 2024 to recognize HCCF's 30th anniversary and pay tribute to the vision of the organization's founders. The award honors a living individual or couple for service as a volunteer, a board member, or a donor who made a significant effort to help grow our community through philanthropy in Huron County. Nominations are submitted by community members and then reviewed by an HCCF committee to select a recipient.

HCCF is pleased to announce the 2025 Community Philanthropy Award recipient is Melissa Deming of Port Austin.

When the Board of Trustees created this award, they listed characteristics the nominees should possess: commitment, leadership, impact, creativity, and collaboration. Melissa has demonstrated each of these qualities through her leadership of Thumb Blessing Boxes, an effort she founded in 2020 to increase food access in a way that is sustainable, anonymous, and accessible. What began as one small box has now grown into a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization serving two counties. Today, there are 15 Blessing Box locations in Huron County as well as multiple boxes on Thumb Area Transit buses.

Melissa's vision and creativity has created space for dozens of volunteers to step forward to serve the community. Each box is supported by its own team of stewards who clean, monitor, and share updates about their community's box. She has also partnered with more than 40 local organizations, which demonstrates the power of collaboration to meet community needs. Thanks to her dedication, Thumb Blessing Boxes has become a model of community philanthropy in action.




PRIVATE CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION
